Papua New Guinea has the highest known rate of avoidable blindness in the Pacific. But with your support throughout 2023, you helped to restore sight to 1,104 people.

One of these people was 79-year-old Siafy who had cataracts in both eyes for more than 30 years. Since 1992, Siafy had been living with unnecessary blindness, unable to work, or enjoy simple pleasures like reading and seeing the smile on his wife Loku's face. It also meant that Loku became the sole provider, while Siafy struggled with daily tasks.

For Siafy, the chance of restoring his sight seemed out of reach. But thanks to our remarkable donors like

you, Siafy underwent lifechanging cataract surgery at a Foundation-supported outreach.

While blindness and low vision in Papua New Guinea is the highest across the region, this is worsened by a severe shortage of eye care specialists.

But with your help, in 2023, 10 eye nurses were trained and two trainee eye doctors completed another year of their Ophthalmology training.

Dr Alice Irafa is one of these

eye specialists. She has been training as an eye doctor through a Foundation-supported scholarship, thanks to your incredible kindness. Your support allows us to invest in training local eye care specialists like Dr Alice, who is now in her fourth and final year of a Masters of Medicine at the University of Papua New Guinea.


Dr Alice is deeply committed to improving the state of eye care in her country.

Thanks to your amazing generosity, we supported the second ever Paediatric Outreach at the Pacific Eye Institute (PEI) in Fiji with our Pacific partners.

One of the children was six-year-old Vasemaca. At just six months old she developed a cataract in her left eye. Her parents tried for years to get her help, but the options were too expensive or overseas. When they learnt of PEI and that the operation was free, they couldn't believe it.

"For the donors to give money for the operation, I think it is the best. For our daughter, we always prayed about it, that she would receive the eyesight, and it eventually happened. We are very grateful for that. It answered our prayers after almost six years now." – Litia, Vasemaca's mum.
